ments, "This is my first year as an officer and I truly enjoy the closeness felt within our class. I'm glad I've had this experience to work with my classmates before I graduate."

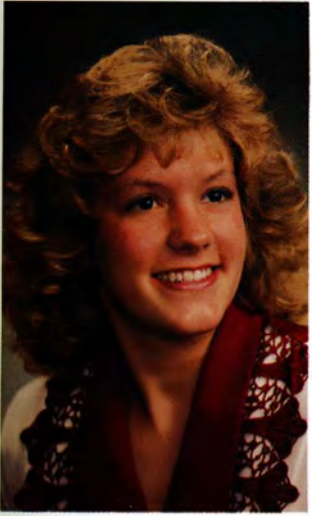

Their answers varied from the most popular response, which was "The first thing I would grab would be my dog," to the not so common answers. Here are some of the different answers sophomores gave in response.

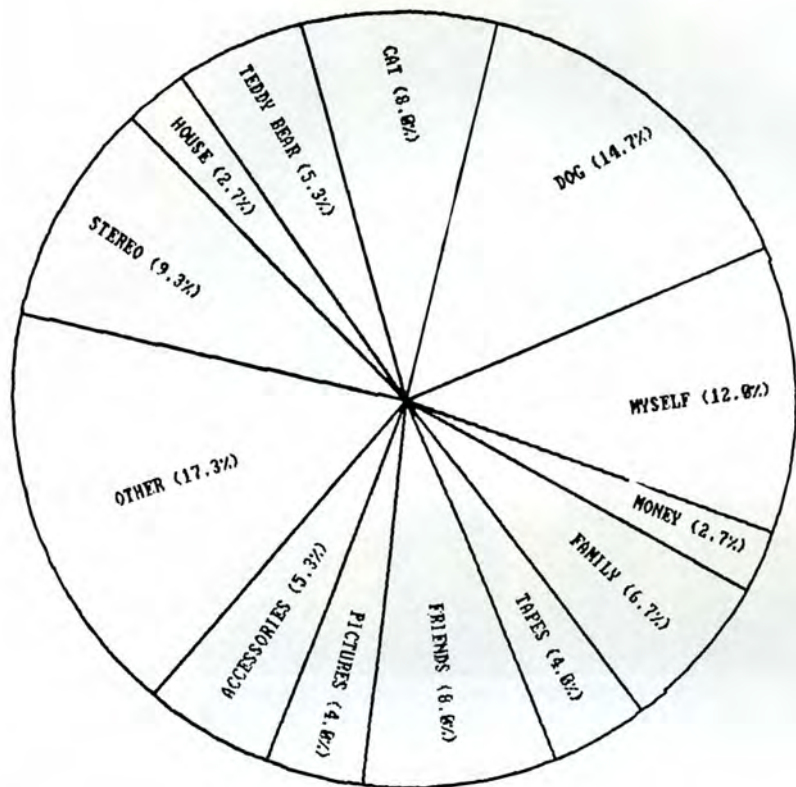

Freshmen know that it's up to them to earn funds to produce a prom for the class of '90 and so far they are off to a great start.

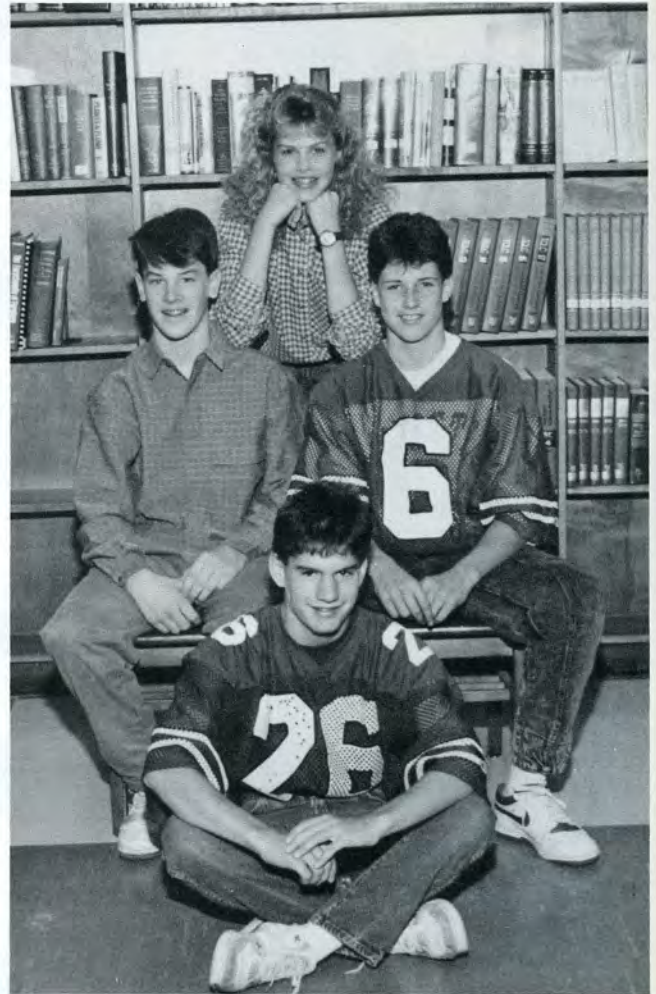

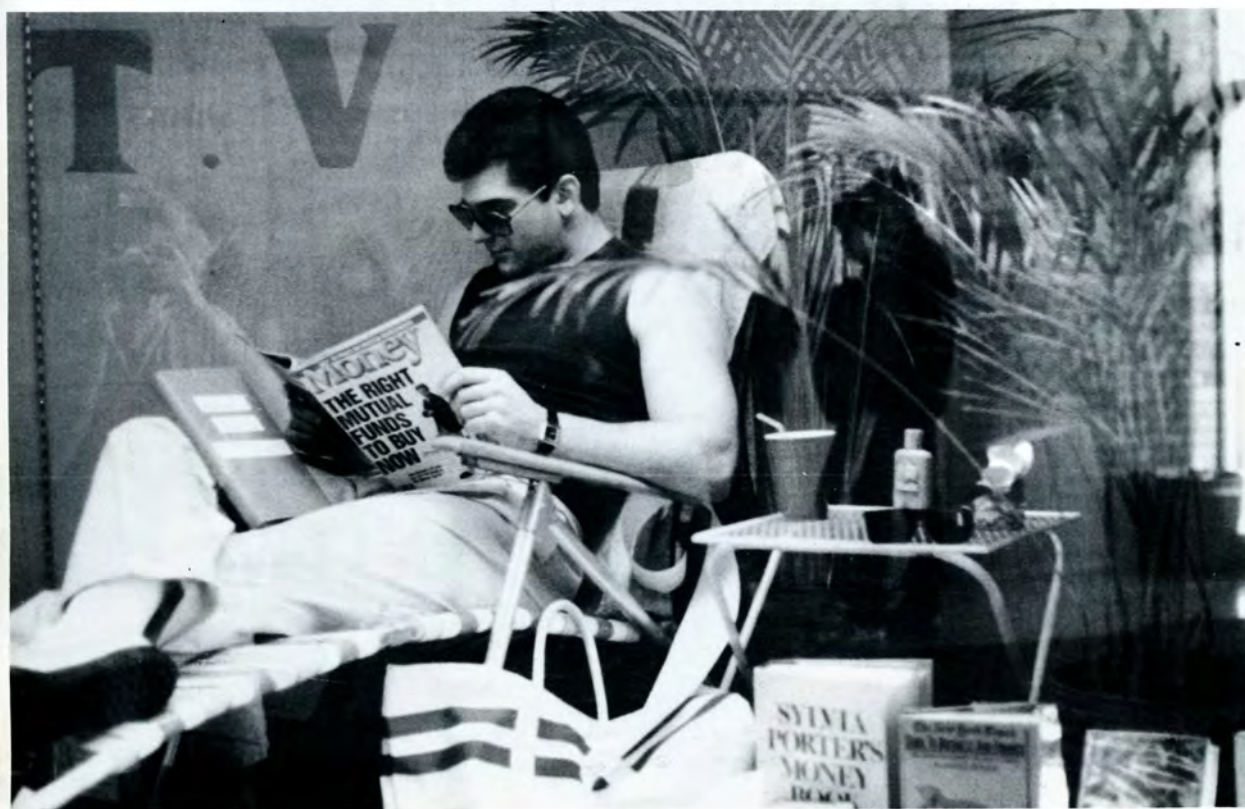

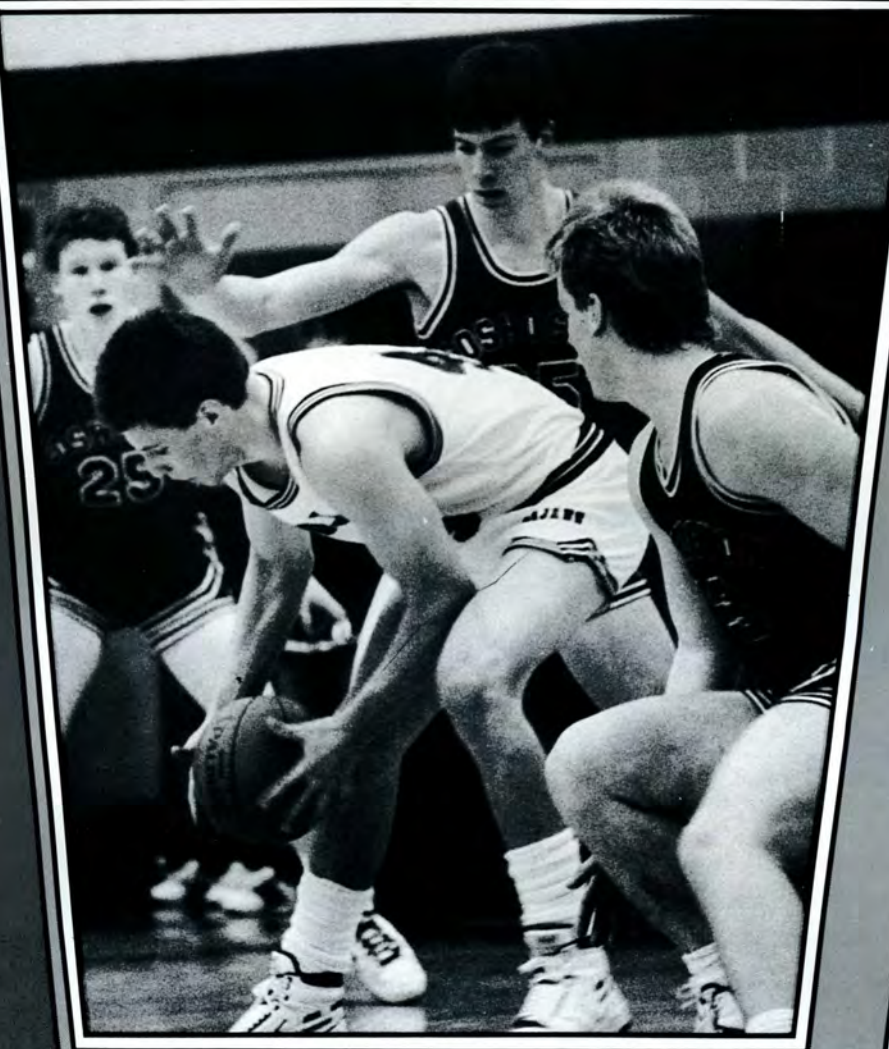

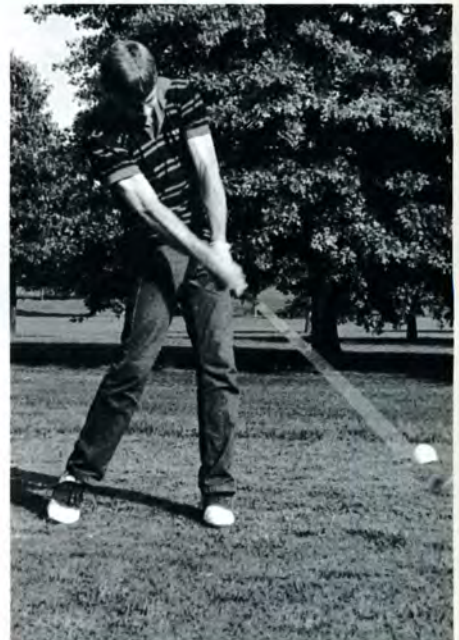


Darrin Vaughan eyes the ball sailing down the fairway as he follows through with his swing.

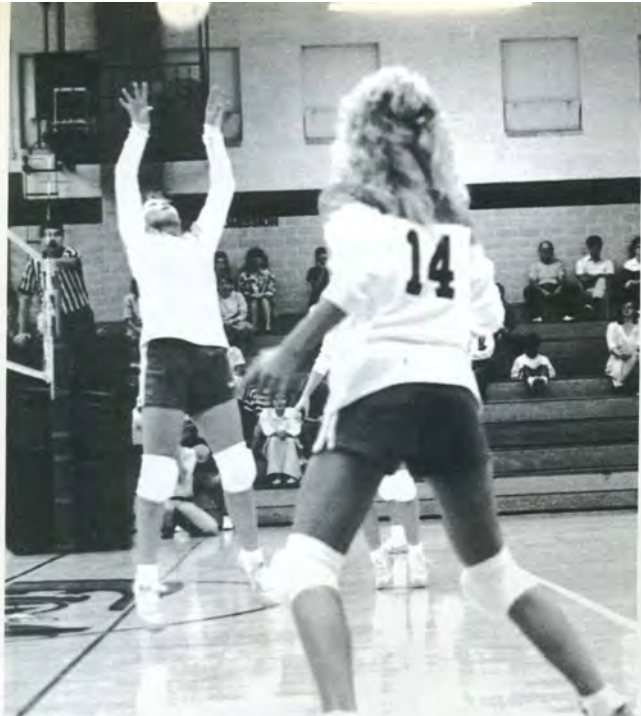

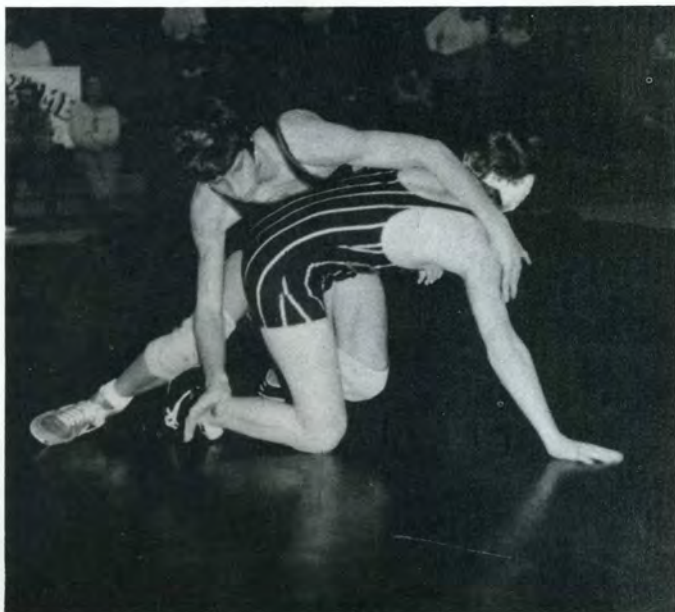

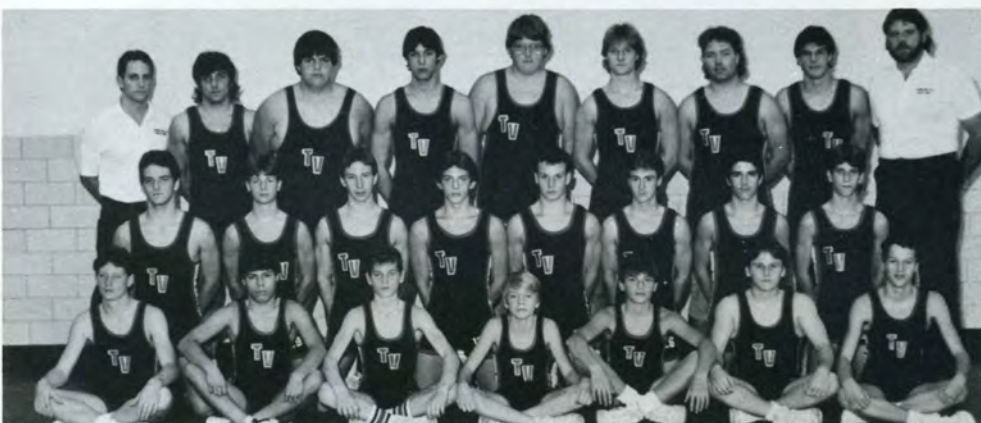

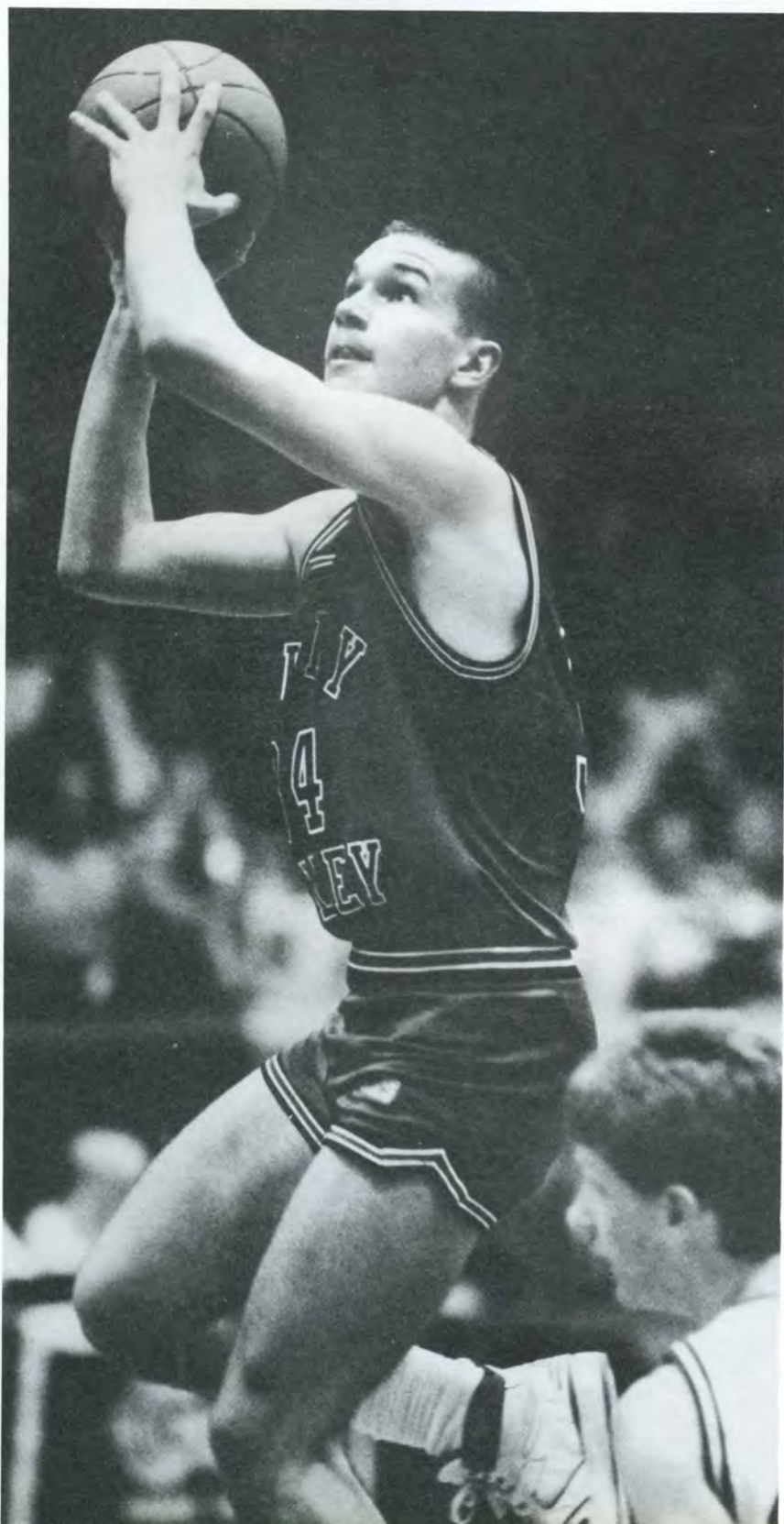

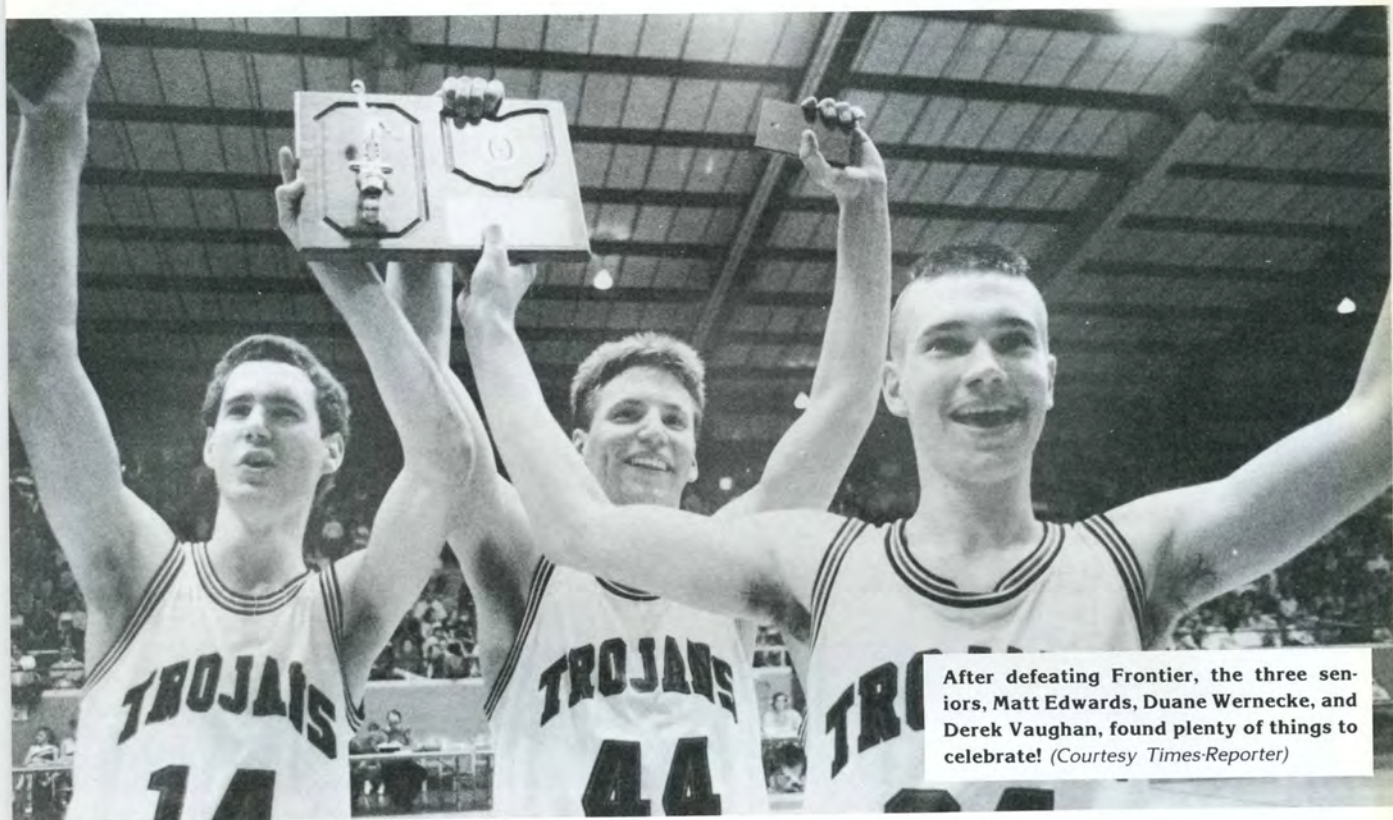

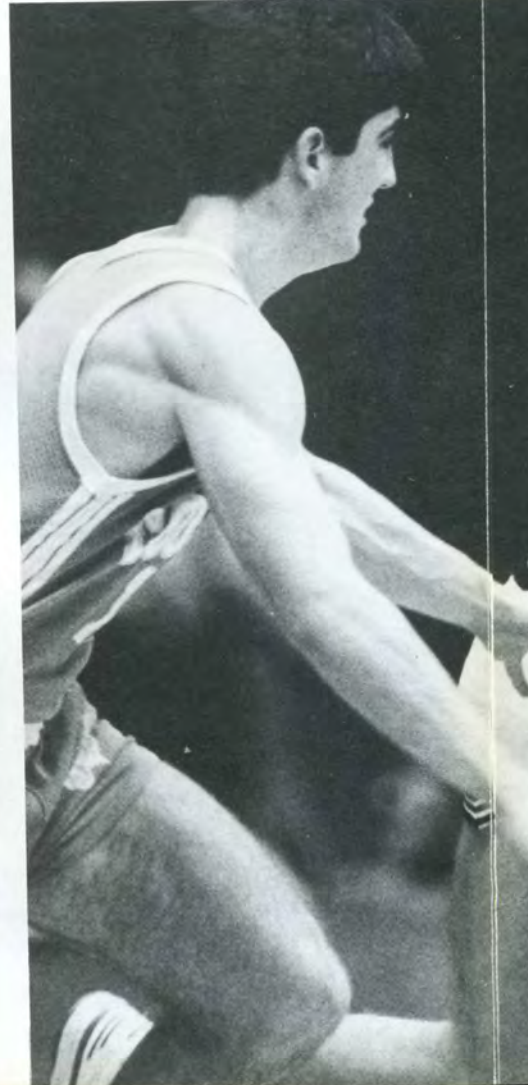
**Displaying why he was chosen as District 5 Player of the Year, Derek Vaughan floats by a Mingo defender towards the bucket.**

who wasn't," commented Derek Vaughan about Tusky not being forecast to win.

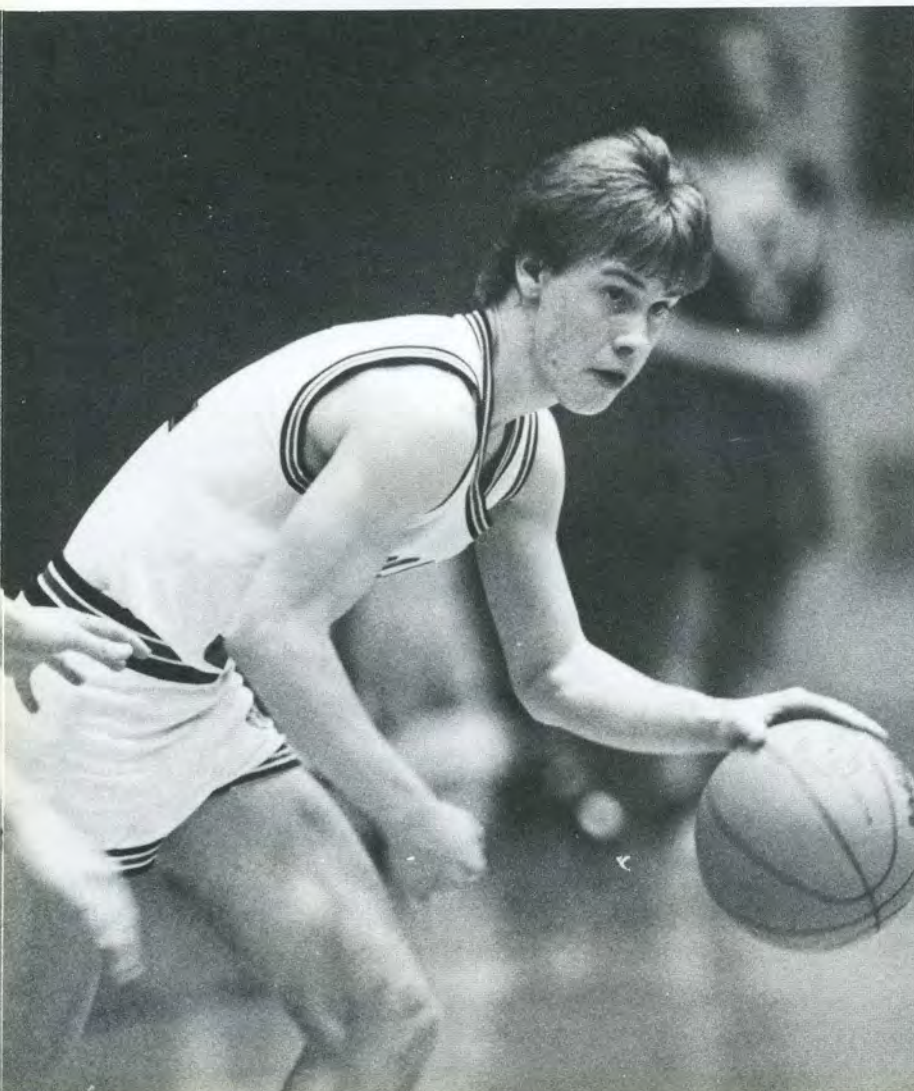

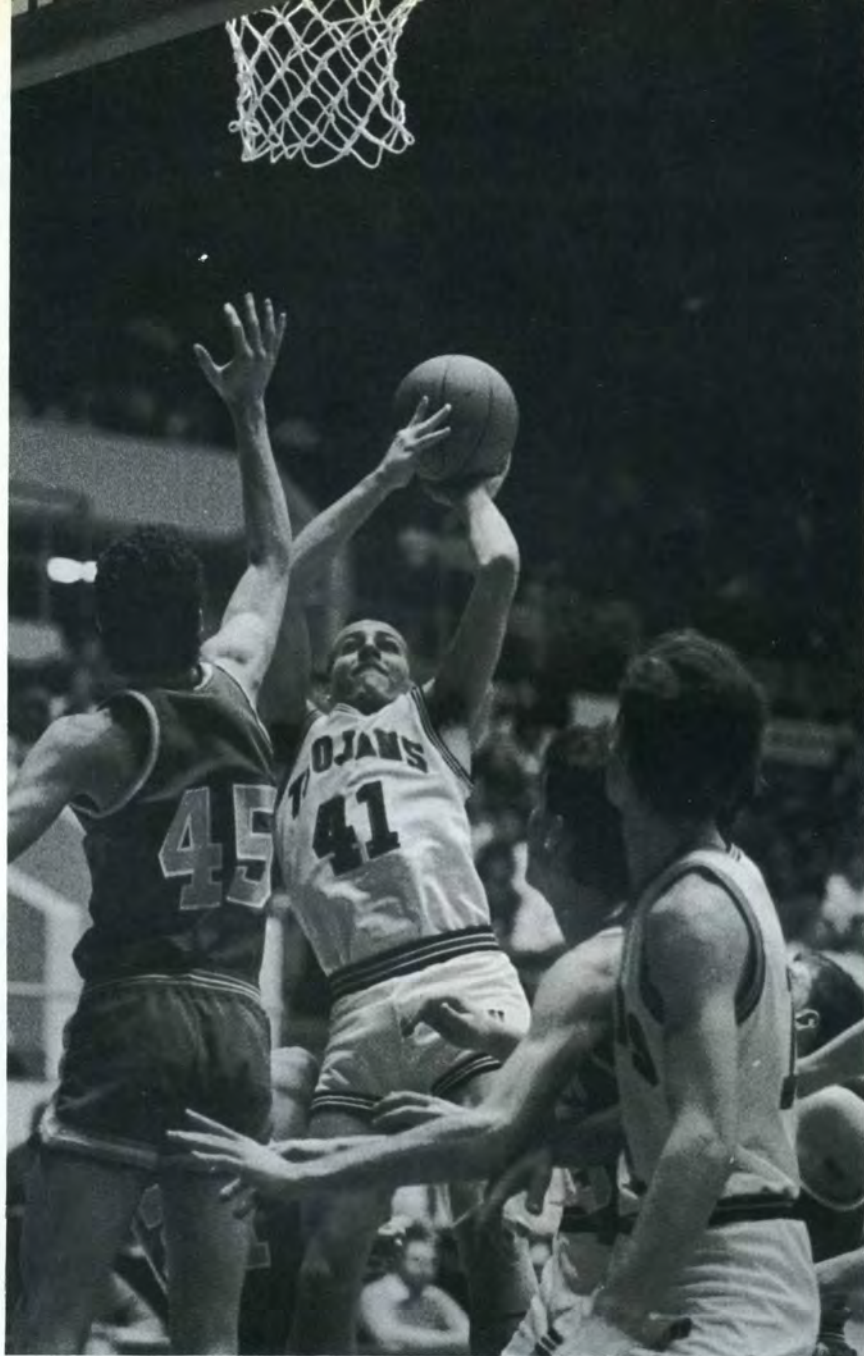

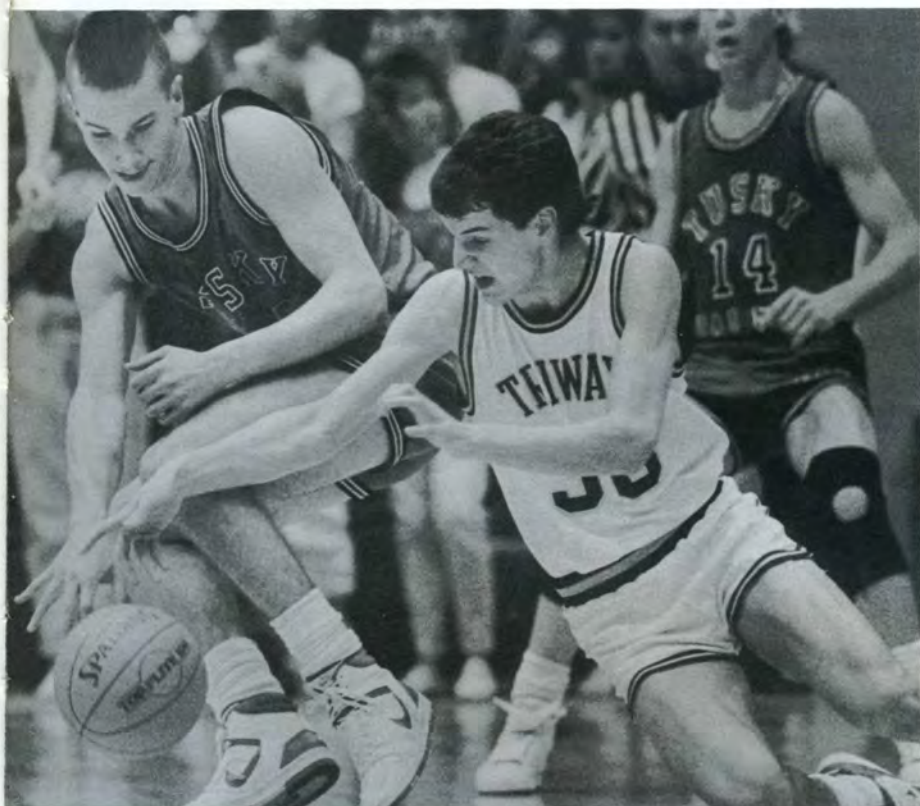
Coach Von Kaenel comments on the state performance. "I was very disappointed. We were so close to being the champions, but we could not hold on."

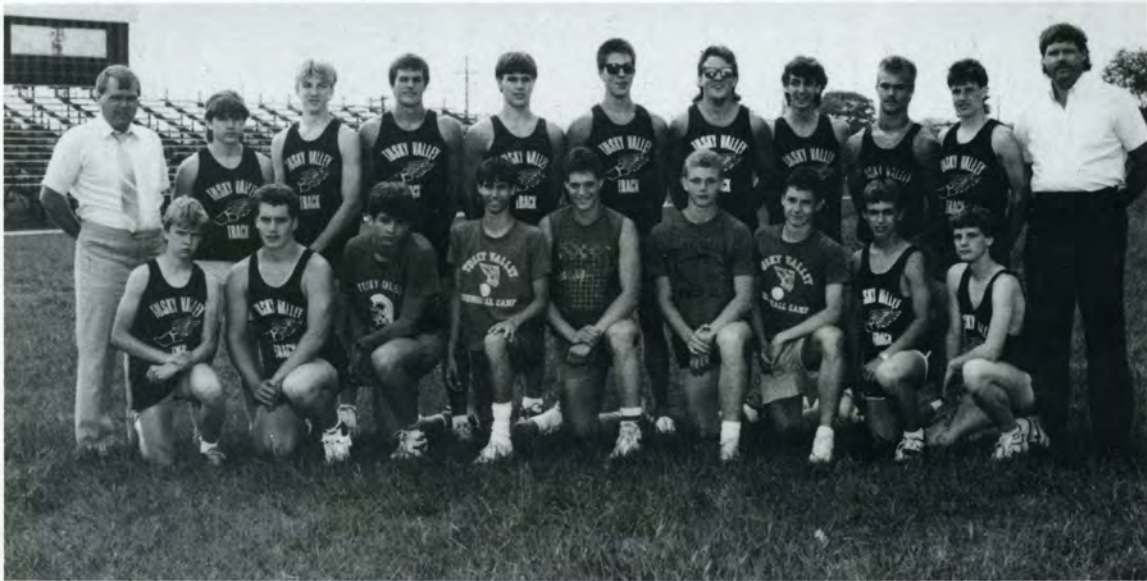

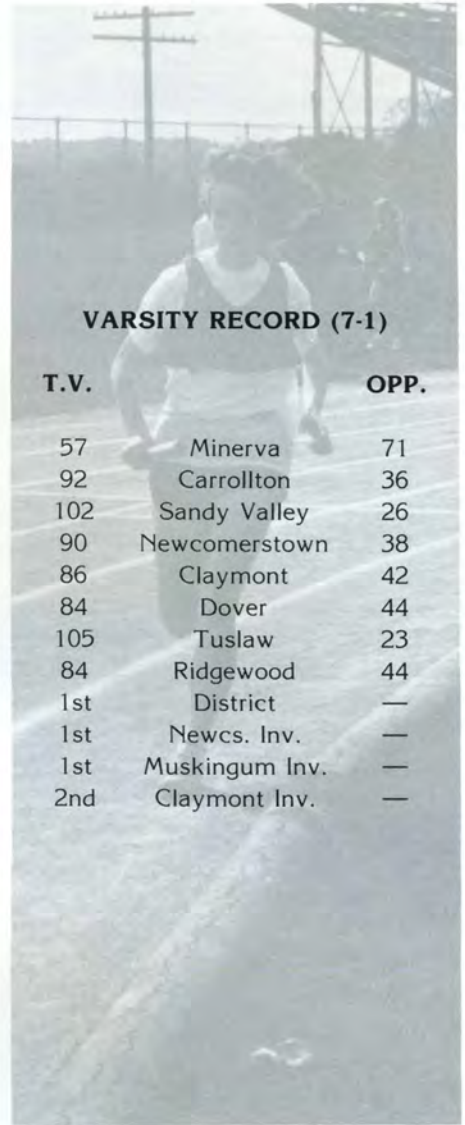

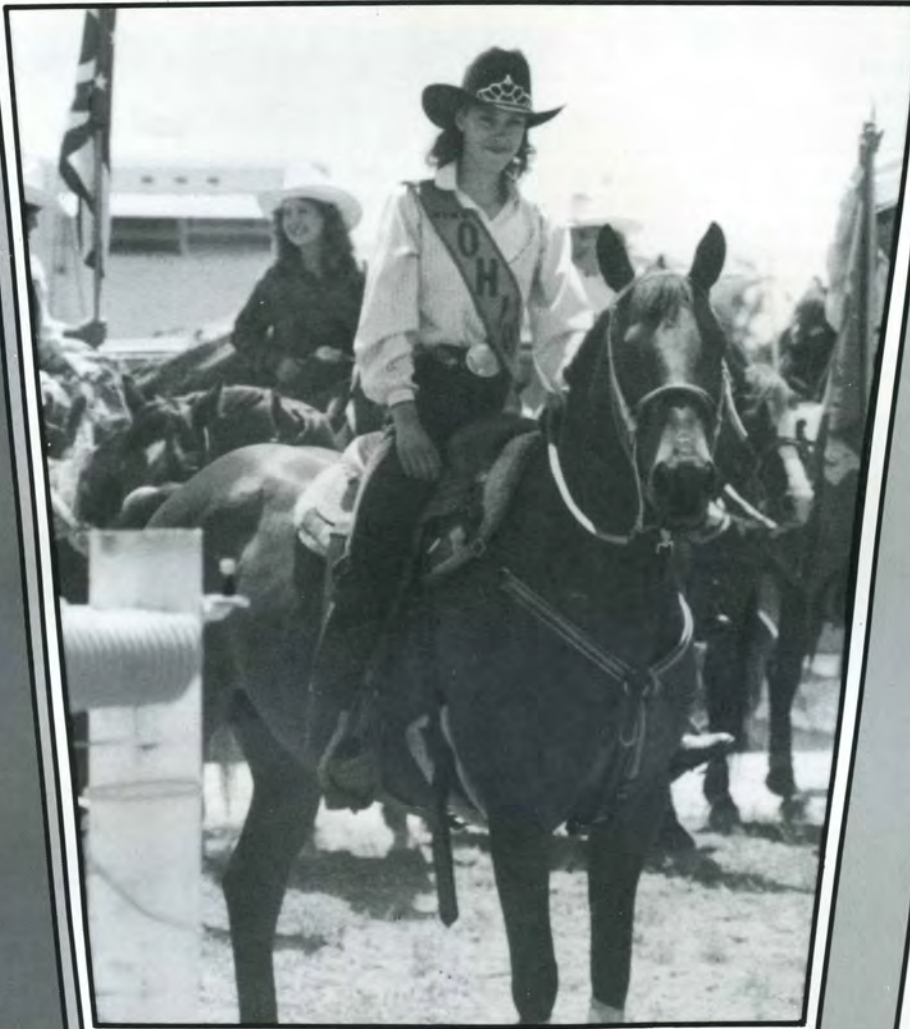
